London is FROZEN!

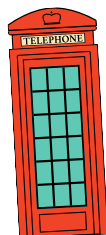
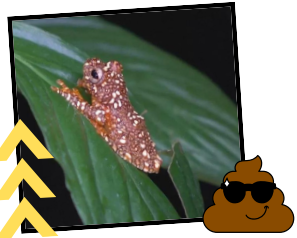
