


Our Five Core Values

Oak Meadow's behaviour system

Our house system will continue this year, and your child will have the chance to earn tokens to help their house win the half-termly behavior trophy.

To recognise and celebrate children's hard work and achievements, the tokens they receive will contribute not only towards their house weekly totals, but also their personal targets to achieve a certificate in recognition of 50, 100, 200, 300 and 500 token milestones.

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It's Good to be Green!

Throughout school we operate the 'Good to be Green' system.

All children start each new day as green with the aim to keep their green cards all day, every day. If children do not adhere to the school rules, then yellow or red cards may be given as sanctions to remind the children of our expectations. It is possible to earn back a green card before the end of the school if the child then shows positive behaviour.

Children who remain green every day over a half-term will also receive an additional reward afternoon to recognise their outstanding behaviour!

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Full STEAM ahead



We're excited to be embedding STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Maths) into all subject areas this year. Every year group will take part in a special STEAM Day during Enrichment Week in February.

To encourage motivation and celebrate effort, we're introducing the 'STEAM Train' reward tracker in all pupils' diaries. Children will earn stickers each half-term for their achievements and for taking part in extra-curricular school clubs.

We're also working to make sure that STEAM learning links naturally across different subjects, helping children see how their learning connects in meaningful ways.

Finally, we'll be offering a termly menu of STEAM-based clubs, open to all children, with particular focus on encouraging participation from pupils who may benefit most.

Reading Writing Maths

KSI: RWI (Read Write Inc.) helps children learn to read by teaching them sounds and letters step-by-step in daily lessons, so they can blend sounds to read words confidently and build up reading fluently. Alongside this, children will be exposed to a range of high-quality texts and authors that help develop their comprehension and love of stories.



KSI: Our Writing Branches help children practise the writing skills they need for their year group while building on what they've learned before. They start by mastering basic skills like letter formation and writing simple words. Then, they move on to writing simple and independent sentences. Each writing unit uses a story to inspire creativity and helps children use the skills they have learned. At the end of the journey, children show what they can do by writing their own piece.



In KSI, maths is taught in small, manageable steps that help children really understand each idea before moving on. Lessons use lots of pictures and practical activities to make learning clear and fun. Teachers use an 'I do, we do, you do' approach, so children first watch, then practise together and finally work independently with confidence. Each day, children also take part in a short arithmetic session to practise and build fluency with key number skills they've learned.









Assessment

Your child will be formatively assessed throughout all of the work they do and complete additional practice and challenge problems in marking tasks.

Maths, reading and writing assessments will take place each half-term and you will receive progress reports for your child at the end of every term.



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How can parents support their child's learning

- •Reading with your child every day even just 10 minutes will have a positive impact.
- •Helping them access online learning resources all their login details can be found in their reading diary.
- •Supporting them with their weekly homework *(given each Friday)* this helps to build on what they've already learned in class and encourages independence.
- •Asking them questions about their day and what they've learned.
- •Looking into topics they're covering at school together this shows them their learning matters and helps build confidence.

Times Tables:

Reception: Focus on counting and number patterns. No times tables yet.


Year I: Start counting in 2s, 5s, and 10s.

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What is a Nurture Group?

A Nurture Group is a small group of pupils who meet on a weekly basis in a welcoming and safe environment to support:

- Developing relationships
- Self-esteem
- Improve children's understanding of and ability to express their emotions

Groups carried out are based around four different areas of need:

- Social & Emotional
- Friendships
- Anger Management
- Behaviour

Sessions are around 20 minutes long and a programme of work will last around 6 weeks.









Who can I talk to about Nurture Group?

If you feel your child would benefit from accessing nurture group, you can speak to your child's class teacher

If your child is selected to attend Nurture Group, a letter will be sent home to inform you.

We ask that parents/ carers complete a Strength and Difficulties Questionnaire (SDQ) as a baseline assessment and then again when the programme of work has ended. If we feel your child would benefit from further support, we can seek this through outside agencies.


